ROADWISE: LEARNING ABOUT TOWNSHIP ROADS

Over the next few newsletters, the township is going to focus on road education. Specifically, why we do what we do, and when we do it to maintain the township local road system. Local road system...what is that?

Let's start with who is responsible for the roads? Even the answer to that question is complicated. By Michigan law, townships do not have jurisdiction of roads; all public township roads are under the jurisdiction the Clinton County Road Commission (CCRC). The CCRC receives money from the Michigan Transportation Fund (MTF) to maintain the roads. MTF is generally funded through revenue generated from fuel taxes and vehicle registrations. Although the CCRC receives the funds directly, it does not mean that it is enough money to maintain, let alone improve, the road system. The road commission specifies the priority of how road funds are used, it makes sense that the funding goes to the highest traveled roads first, which would be highways and county primary roads. Watertown Township has federal highways, state highways, county primary, local roads, subdivision roads, and a few private roads within its borders. The road commission cost-shares some of its funding with the townships in the county for local road projects. Watertown Township receives approximately \$40,000 a year from the CCRC for local road projects, such as crack filing, and graveling, etc. In comparison, it costs about \$80,000 a year just to chloride the township gravel roads. Quite frankly, the township could take the stance that the roads are not our responsibility and watch the roads fall into disrepair, like they used to be, or, the township could participate in road maintenance and improvements. It is the adage, "you get, what you pay for."

In the last 23 years, Watertown Township has had a very active local road maintenance program. The Township Board prioritizes the maintenance of township roads and has steadily increased road funding as available, even through the challenging financial setbacks a decade ago. The township uses a data-driven approach for prioritizing road work, which uses the condition of the road and its correlating recommended fix for the current rating, using the Pavement Surface Evaluation & Rating System (PASER). Every township road is evaluated using this system.

The township has been actively working toward the goal that no township road reaches a PASER rating of 5, without a plan being in place for improvement. For instance, knowing that a project that impacts the road is coming, and delaying township road improvements until after the work is completed, so that we are not damaging roads after they have just been improved.

Data shows that maintaining roads in good to fair condition costs exponentially less than rebuilding roads after they have been allowed to deteriorate. There are various ways to do that, many

of which you may have experienced. Good roads receive crack fill and patching yearly. Fair roads usually receive chip seal and micro surfacing treatments. Reconstruction happens when the road has deteriorated beyond repair. Michigan's four-season climate, combined with the increasing number of intense storm events, makes it difficult to maintain the roads.

The Watertown Township Board has used data and the cost-effectiveness of treatments as the basis for the road maintenance program in the township. In 2023, \$750,000 was budgeted for road maintenance and to save for multiyear projects. The township has consistently made budgeting for road maintenance a top priority. The current approximate costs for road maintenance demonstrate how costly it is for road upkeep.

New Voting Laws and Changes For Michigan Elections

As stated in the Spring 2023 newsletter, Michigan is undergoing significant changes to elections and voting laws due to the passage of Ballot Proposal 22-2 amending the Michigan Constitution. The proposal passed with over 60% approval (including passage in Watertown Charter Township) and the changes are now enshrined in the Michigan Constitution. The Michigan Department of State, Municipal Clerks (township and city), and County Clerks are working together to roll out processes and orchestrate complex systems that comply with new laws. The most impactful changes to voters are:



NINE DAYS OF EARLY IN-PERSON VOTING:


Voters will now have another option to tabulate your ballot in-person. Early voting will take place in the nine consecutive days starting the 2nd Saturday prior to Election Day through the Sunday prior to the Election for all **state** and **federal** elections (eight hours each day). Beginning with the Presidential Primary in 2024, Watertown Charter Township is partnering with Clinton County to provide two early voting sites for our residents: one in nearby DeWitt Charter Township and the other in the northern part of the county in Bingham Township. For every **state** and **federal** election, these sites will be open for early voting. Please note: Watertown Charter Township is not an early voting site, but all Watertown Charter Township residents can use either of the two Clinton County sites. Residents who choose this option will vote and insert their ballot into the tabulator at that time. You will not have the opportunity to change your vote later. Early in-person voting is not available for local special elections. Regardless of which method you use to vote...early at an alternate site in Clinton County, by absent voter ballot, or on Election Day in Watertown Township...**only one ballot will be tabulated per voter.**



NEW WAYS TO OBTAIN AN ABSENTEE BALLOT:

Many township voters have applied to the permanent absent voter APPLICATION list and are familiar with the process of receiving an application by mail prior to each election. This process will be changing. The 2024 Presidential Primary will be the last election that an absent voter application will be mailed by the Watertown Charter Township Clerk's Office to individuals on the permanent absent voter list (though special interest groups not affiliated with the township may continue to send applications). For elections after the 2024 Presidential Primary, voters may *opt-in* to automatically receive a BALLOT – not an application – sent to their registered home or mailing address for each election. Voters should note that, unlike other pieces of mail, ballots cannot be forwarded by the USPS. If you choose to opt-in to the permanent ballot option and will be at another address when ballots are sent, **you are responsible for notifying the clerk's office in writing of the alternate address to send your ballot for that election.** Snowbirds and college students should take care to verify where they want a ballot sent. Failure to provide an updated address will signic cantly delay the delivery of your ballot.

You will only need to apply a single time. Permanent ballot status moves with the voter when you update your registration address within the state, including across jurisdictions. You can request to be taken off the list at any time.

RETURN OF BALLOTS & APPLICATION:

Provisions in Proposal 22-2 require a state-funded absentee ballot DROP BOX and PAID POSTAGE for the return of absent voter applications and ballots. There are now two secure, camera-monitored drop boxes available at the Watertown Charter Township office: a walk-up box that drops directly into a locked area within the building, and a metal drive-up drop box near the bell tower at the township office. You can confirm that your voted ballot has been received at www.michigan.gov/vote. More tools are under development that will allow you to opt-in to receive email/text notifications to track your ballot.





OTHER PROVISIONS FROM THE PASSAGE OF PROPOSAL 22-2:

- Every voter is asked to provide a photo ID when voting in-person. The right to sign an affidavit to verify voter identity if you are not in possession of photo ID has now been enshrined in the Michigan Constitution.
- Military and Overseas Ballots are now considered timely if received by the Clerk's office within six days of the election.
- If an AV ballot is rejected because a signature doesn't match or the signature is missing, voters now have up to three days after Election Day to remedy the issue.
- Election audits must be conducted publicly under the Secretary of State's supervision and not be affiliated with a political party.
- Results of the election shall be determined solely by the ballots cast and certified by the Board of Canvassers. Neither the Board of Canvassers nor the legislature can override the will of the voters.
- Each registered voter has a fundamental right to vote. No person or legal entity can act to interfere with that right, either by act of law or by harassment or intimidation. There are misdemeanor and felony penalties for violating election laws.

General Property Tax Information:

Your 2023 winter property tax statement(s) will be mailed the last week of November. Winter 2023 taxes are payable from December 1, 2023, through February 14, 2024. Please see the back of your tax statement for payment options.

Please be sure to include the bottom portion of your tax bill with your payment, making address corrections if needed.

Summer and winter property taxes paid after February 14, 2024:

Late payments will be assessed a 3% penalty. On March 1, 2024, taxes not paid will be considered delinquent and turned over to the Clinton County Treasurer's Department. Please remember that the township does NOT accept mailing postmarks when determining timely payments.

There is a secure drop box located on the front of the building near the entrance facing Wacousta Road. Payments placed in the drop box after hours will be applied on the next township business day. DO NOT use the large silver library drop box or the voter drop box.

Tax statements that are paid by escrow payments from your mortgage lender will be mailed to the property owner with a watermark stating, "COURTESY COPY."

When making payment by check, the township accepts the written numerical portion as legal tender.

Partial tax and sewer payments are accepted. Remember that applicable fees and interest will be applied on the balance due after the due date.

*Township offices will be open on Friday, December 29, 2023, from 9am - 5pm to accept tax payments.

AEDS AVAILABLE AT WATERTOWN TOWNSHIP

In the interest of public health, safety, and welfare, Watertown Charter Township has installed two new state-of-the-art Automated External Defibrillators (AED) machines. One new AED is located in the gym entry hallway. The other new AED is located in the township hall office. Each machine is marked with a sign. The AED station includes a First Response Kit with gloves, a razor, scissors, and gauze pads to be helpful in an emergency.



An AED is used to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. It is a sophisticated, yet easy-to-use, medical device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the heart reestablish an effective rhythm.

Watertown Township staff recently participated in an AED training. AEDs are portable and can be used by nonmedical, lay-rescuers making it possible for more people to respond to a medical emergency when defibrillation is required. The state-of-the-art unit will talk you through providing CPR with specific but simple instructions.

Please remember, in the event of an emergency, ALWAYS CALL 911 FIRST.

WACOUSTA CEMETERY

ORDINANCE UPDATED - The Wacousta Cemetery Ordinance was recently amended. A copy can be found at the ordinance button on the main page of the township website.

GRAVESITE REMINDERS - Due to the high costs of maintaining the cemetery, it is necessary for the township to enforce the Wacousta Cemetery Ordinance (Section 8-8). Only grave markers (headstones), plantings eight inches in front of a grave marker, and flower urns are allowed to be placed on gravesites. Artificial flowers, grave blankets, and artificial wreaths are permitted at ground level on gravesites during the winter months, from November 1 to April 1. **PROHIBITED ITEMS** include but are not limited to: artificial flowers that are not in permitted urns, artificial wreaths, glass items, statues, ornaments, solar lights, glass, alcohol, ornamental flags, mulch, shepherd hooks, and flowerpots. View the cemetery ordinance online to see a complete listing of prohibited items.

We know that items have sentimental value, and we want to be considerate of your loved ones, so we are asking that you remove any prohibited items at this time. If the items are not removed, the Sexton will remove prohibited items and place them outside the storage barn for 60 days for your retrieval. Remaining items will be disposed of after that time.

COLUMBARIUM - The installation of a 48-niche columbarium has been completed. A columbarium is a granite structure that contains individual 12"x12" vault spaces (niches) that can hold up to two urns containing cremains (human ash remains). Engraving of decedent name and dates can be placed on the front of the niche. Construction is continuing on the cremains garden area around the columbarium. The serene garden is slated to be complete with plantings and benches in the Spring of 2024. Columbarium niches are available for purchase at the Watertown Charter Township Office. TOWNSHIP MASTER PLAN UPDATE

In 2016, the township adopted a new master plan to help guide future development. State law requires townships with adopted master plans to review these documents approximately every five years. The Planning Commission began this review process over a year ago and has been working diligently to complete this five-year review since that time.

In 2022, the Planning Commission held an open house and solicited feedback on a draft of the plan's main strategies and policies. Thoughtful feedback from township residents was received and included in the plan to the greatest extent possible. As the remaining items of the draft master plan have been completed, the Planning Commission has begun a statutory 63-day review period, which allows the township's neighbors, utility providers, and other agencies time to review and provide comments on the draft plan, prior to adoption. Township residents and business owners are also encouraged to review and provide comments on the draft plan.

The final step in this review process will be a public hearing, which will be advertised in the Lansing State Journal, on the township's website, and will be posted outside the township hall on the bulletin board. While a specific date has not yet been selected for the public hearing, it's likely to be scheduled in early 2024. You can sign up to receive email notifications of meeting agendas and public hearing notices on the township website at https://www.watertownmi.gov/subscribe.

The draft master plan document is available online for review on the township website at https://www.watertownmi.gov/planning-zoning. The link to the PDF is listed in blue at the top of the page. Again, the Planning Commission encourages your participation in this process – the master plan is most effective when township residents provide comment and feedback

The Planning Commission meets monthly on the first Wednesday, at 7pm in the south room of the township hall. All Planning Commission meetings are open to the public, and we encourage your attendance and any additional comments you may wish to share on the master plan or any other planning-related issues.



TOWNSHIP VENDOR/PEDDLER ORDINANCE

Has someone shown up at your house attempting to sell you something? Did you know that Watertown Charter Township has a Vendor Ordinance that requires anyone vending, selling, or soliciting within the township to obtain a current vendor license? The purpose of this ordinance is to regulate vendors, peddlers, solicitors, and to protect the public health, safety, and welfare of the residents. Vending activity is prohibited at private residences prior to 9am and after 7pm. Vending is not permitted on property where the owner or occupant has posted a "no soliciting" or similar sign on premises. The township does not currently have any active vendor licenses at the time of this publication. If someone attempts to sell or solicit at your residence, please ask for their current license. Note that religious and political organizations are exempt from this requirement. NOTARY SERVICE AVAILABLE

The Michigan Department of State commissions approximately 1,300 notaries public each month. The total number of notaries public currently commissioned in the State of Michigan is more than 113,000. A notary public is an officer appointed by the Michigan Secretary of State to attest to the authenticity of a person's signature, to administer oaths, and to witness acknowledgements. Notarization on a document certifies that the person named on it appeared before the notary, displayed valid identification, and was in the presence of the notary at the time of signature.

Watertown Charter Township provides notary services for our residents. There are several notaries available in the office during business hours. A notary cannot provide advice of any kind regarding documents, including the legalities of a document and/or where a signature is required. This notary service is offered free of charge.

DEER SEASON

With deer season upon us, motorists should pay extra attention to their surroundings when driving. Motorists should remember to never swerve for a deer, which could cause a more serious crash. If you hit a deer with your vehicle, call 911 for a car/deer crash report at any time of the day. Clinton County Central Dispatch maintains a list of people who are interested in a deer if it is struck by a car and is in good shape. Anyone interested in being placed on that list should call Central Dispatch at (989) 224-6792.

If you are heading into the woods for any reason during hunting season, always remember to wear hunter's orange so you can be seen by other hunters. Also, remember to practice safety when carrying your weapon of choice while hunting.

ROADKILL SALVAGE

If you would like to keep a deer that has been struck and killed by a vehicle, The Michigan Department of Natural Resources website now has a Michigan Road Kill Salvage application that can be filled out online. This application allows a person to obtain a free salvage permit to possess wildlife killed in vehicular collisions. To find out more please visit the DNR website at http://www.michigan.gov/dnr.

BURN PERMITS

Remember to obtain a burn permit from your local fire department before burning leaves. If you are caught burning leaves without a permit, it could lead to a fine. In Watertown Township, you can apply for a burn permit online via the Looking Glass Regional Fire Authority link on the township website.

TRAVEL

If you are leaving for the holidays on vacation or for a long weekend, please call the Clinton County Sheriff's Office at (989) 224-6792 to schedule a property check. The Sheriff's Office will put your home on a list for deputies to check while you are away, which helps to deter possible break-ins.

Some other ways to deter break-ins are to put your lights and TVs on a timer, leave a vehicle in the driveway, or have a family member stop by to make it look like someone is home. Also, have your mail stopped by the postal service; mail and newspapers left in the mailbox are an indicator for criminals that no one is home.

LARCENY FROM AUTOMOBILES

This summer saw a rash of larceny from automobiles in the Watertown Township and Dewitt Township area. Please remember to keep your vehicle(s) locked at night when parked in your driveway. Criminals are looking for unlocked vehicles so they can steal gifts, electronics, etc. Locked vehicles are a deterrent to criminals from breaking into them.

During the holiday shopping season please keep your gifts hidden in your vehicle. Put gifts and other items in the trunk of your vehicle; if there isn't a way to put them in the trunk, keep them covered with a blanket. This will also deter criminals from breaking into your vehicle.
